CARING FOR GOD'S WORLD

Practical Steps to becoming an Environmentally Friendly Church for the New Millennium

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HOW TO USE THIS PACK

"Caring for God's World" has been produced for use by churches, church schools and other church-based projects. The pack is designed to help church councils, governing bodies and management committees carry out a simple environmental audit.

- Present the pack to your church council, governing body or management committee.
- Appoint an individual or sub-committee to oversee the audit process.
- Those delegated to oversee the audit, work through the questionnaire sheets, ticking the
- black boxes which focus on the current practice of your organisation. Separate sheets can be passed to appropriate people to be filled in by those responsible for a particular area.
- The individual/sub-committee reports back to the main committee making recommendations of practical action that could be taken to improve your organisation's environmental profile. We recommend that a time-scale is set for implementing these decisions.
- Those overseeing the audit see that the agreed actions are followed through.
- At the end of the time agreed, those overseeing the process work through the same questionnaire sheets, ticking the coloured boxes which focus on the changes that have been put into place through the audit. They can fill out the Evaluation Sheet that can be found at the end of the questionnaire section.
- Present the results of the evaluation to the church council, governing body or management committee.
- You may wish to contact your local newspaper to inform them of the actions that you have taken. Environmental stories are popular with local journalists and it will make good publicity for your organisation.

1. ENERGY

Energy sources such as fossil fuels, coal, oil and natural gas cannot be renewed or replace and they cause pollution whether used in appliances or for generating electricity

2. WASTE

We produce over 500 million tonnes of waste annually in the UK, of which 90? goes to landfill sites. The UK Government target is for 25% of current levels of domestic waste to be recycled by the year 2000

Are you doing all you can to reduce waste?

Here are some ideas for your PCC, Governing Body or Management Committee to consider:

(a) PAPER

Saving paper saves trees; the processes employed in its production use nonrenewable resources and add to pollution

Do you use recycled paper (The price may be a little higher but if more people use it the price could come down)

Do you use brown manila envelopes? (They are cheaper and cause less pollution in production)

Do you re-use envelopes whenever it is practical to do so? Labels are available for this purpose

Do you re-use paper that has been printed on one side only for internal notes, painting or drawing in Sunday School, or notice boards?

Do you have designated box where such paper can be place?

Do you place all waste paper in a bin or sack and arrange for it to be taken to the nearest recycling bank?

Do you, where possible, avoid purchasing goods with excess packaging?

(b) IN THE KITCHEN/CATERING

Do you designate separate bins or sacks for waste packaging, tins and bottles and arrange for them to be taken to the nearest recycling centre?

Do you use re-usable cups or plates rather than disposable plastic or paper ones?

Do you encourage your members to adopt these measures in their own homes?

(c) WATER

We have generally become more aware of the need to save water in recent years: are you making sure your members are of it?

Do you regularly inspect your pipes, radiators and taps and ensure any leaks or drips are attended to promptly?

Do you, avoid over-filling urns, kettles etc so as not to waste water?

Do you ensure that outside taps e.g. in the churchyard, do not drip or are left running?

Have you placed warning notices above taps to remind users not to waste water?

Do you use a water 'hippo' in your toilet cistern to reduce water consumption? (The 'hippo' is a device available from water companies, designed to reduce capacity and thereby to lessen the water used at each flush. Put a brick in the cistern as a temporary alternative)

When replacing cisterns or installing new ones have you considered purchasing 'double flush' systems?

Have you considered other ways to promote water conservation e.g. collecting rainwater for gardens and recycling water?

Have you considered paying water bills by meter rather than by a uniform charge?

We are becoming more aware of potential risks to our health and that of our children by e.g. pesticide residues in food, and the use of bleach and phosphate based detergents that add to the poisoning of our rivers and water-courses. Our attention is also drawn to the issue of fair trade.

This is true even in the inner city where the presence and abundance of wildlife is increasingly being realised

Are you careful to choose hymns that emphasise stewardship, care and the joy of nature (rather than ones that reinforce the idea of human domination over nature)?

Do you review the words used in your services and make changes sensitive to the needs of children, women, older people and the environment?

Do you encourage awareness of the beauty of God's creation both in the city and in the countryside e.g. by arranging local walks, outings, Quiet Days and Retreats?

Do you invite local market traders to our Harvest Festival?

Do you use the ceremony of Beating the Bounds (traditionally observed on Rogation Sunday) in order to increase the awareness of the area, and its communities and neighbours for which your church has some responsibility?
